






MAKE A CRAFTY PIZZA

ABORIGINAL FLAG STAINED GLASS ARTWORK

Create your very own stained glass window of the aboriginal flag! Fold a piece of black paper in half lengthways. Then reopen it. Draw along the middle line and cut along the edge, making sure you leave a gap at either end. From this cut, continue to cut out a smaller rectangle in the bottom half of the flag, leaving a border intact. Cut out a circle from yellow paper for the sun. You can use an upside-down cup or a glass to trace the shape of the circle. Glue the circle in the middle of the paper. Cut out some wide strips of red cellophane. Turn the page over and glue the cellophane to the edges of your black sheet of paper. Once dry, you can hang it on your window, and light will shine through.








MAKE A MINI MARKET








MAKE A TRAIN

Then take your first box. Cut 1 toilet roll in half, so you have two cylinders. Tape 1 cylinder to the front of the box and the second cylinder to the top. 






CREATE A CITYSCAPE COLLAGE



FLOWER ART

Kids love exploring nature with a camera. Take a close up photo of a flower and then draw from your photograph. For your drawing, break the flower down into simple shapes. 






COW PUPPETS








EXPRESS YOURSELF WITH WRITING
